Invitation to our PVS Autumn Meeting, 26th and 27th November (VIRTUAL MEETING!)

I am delighted that we have been able to put together an online programme for this autumn and very much hope that you are able to support the society by attending. We are very grateful to MSD Animal Health for generously sponsoring this meeting and who we thank for their ongoing support in these difficult times. Please note that this is a joint meeting with BVPA. We are sorry that we are unable to meet up with our poultry colleagues in person but look forward to this joint collaboration.

A combined team from PVS and BVPA have prepared an excellent scientific programme. Virtual conference arrangements have been organised by MYT, and coordinated by Allison Kirwan. I am very grateful to them all for pulling together what will be an excellent meeting and which contains all the content of the planned physical meeting.

We will be covering such diverse topics as cutting edge vaccine and phage technology to revisiting some old and familiar diseases such as Salmonella, Influenza and Erysipelas which impact both pigs and poultry. Finally, we are hoping to arrange a session at the end of the day from Stewart Houston to update the society on the Animal Health and Welfare Pathway. While this may not have crossed your radar yet we are all going to hear a lot more about this over next few years not least as a lot of potential government funding for the pig industry will be channelled this way, but it is only applicable to England-devolved governments are making their own post Brexit plans. PVS have been heavily involved in the early stages of the development of this pathway.
